Project Background & Context









"We are a small business so often we just have one employee working the shop. I had to pay \$700 in parking tickets this year because I could[n't] leave to move my car."

Top concerns:

- Constant interruptions
- Extra stress
- Lost productivity

"Employees want free parking. Right now, employees take turns between haircuts to move their cars. If they are in the middle of a haircut, they are often ticketed..."





Project Goals











In pilot areas

- 1. Increase parking availability in residential areas
- 2. Reduce **greenhouse gas emissions** associated with the "two-hour shuffle"
- 3. Increase information about **alternatives to driving** and parking

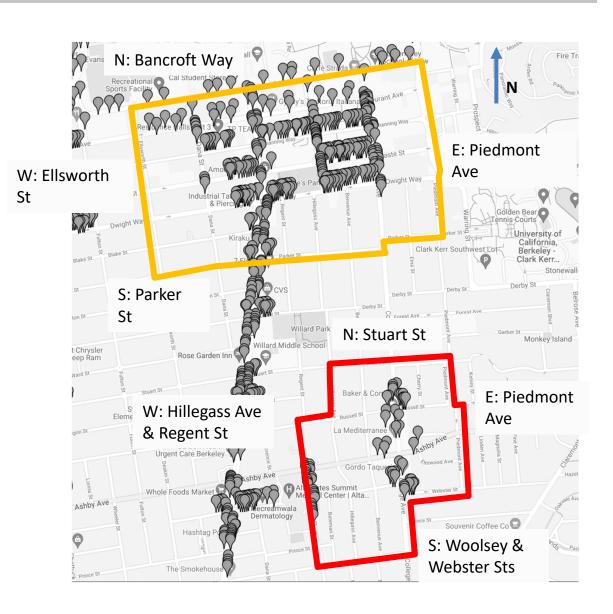

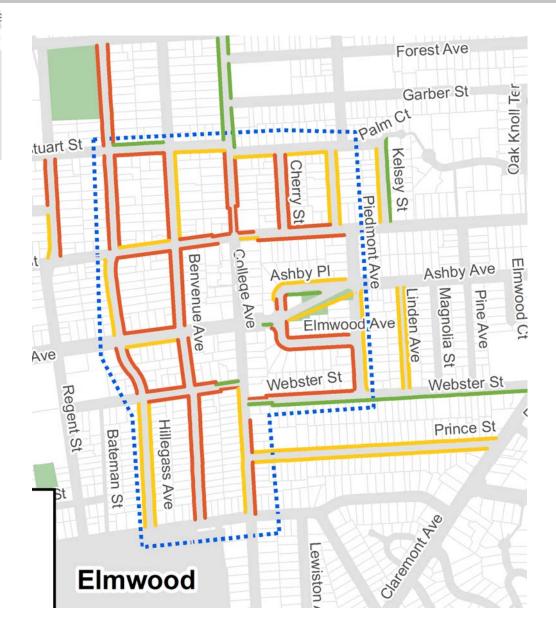

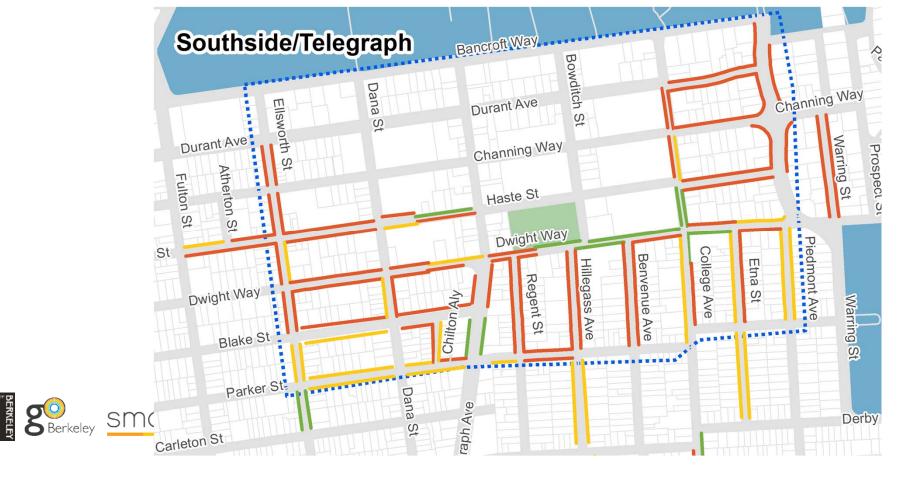

Conceptual Proposals - Considerations











- Balance needs of residents and businesses as much as possible
- Provide options for folks who may need to drive, but don't induce new driving
- Pilot should be easy to understand
- Provide ways to pay with minor aesthetic impact







Conceptual Proposals - Tools







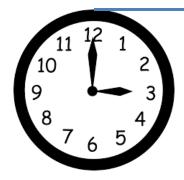






Paid parking for visitors

To achieve open spaces at busiest times via pay by phone or kiosk



Longer time limits for more visitor flexibility



Clearer signage to simplify parking experience



Information about commute options to reduce demand for parking





Conceptual Proposals











- One "zone" throughout the pilot areas
- Employees & visitors pay hourly rate
- Payment 8 a.m. 7 p.m., Mon-Sat, by phone or new license plate payment kiosks
- Prices will be adjusted if needed for 1-2 open spaces
- Time limits extended to 8 hours max
- Work with merchant groups about commute benefits

Elmwood: Progressive rate (longer stays more expensive) Up to 4 hours \$1.00/hr, 4:01-6 hrs \$2.00/hr, 6:01-8 hrs \$3.00/hr

Southside/Telegraph: flat rate of \$1.50/hour

Progressive rate:

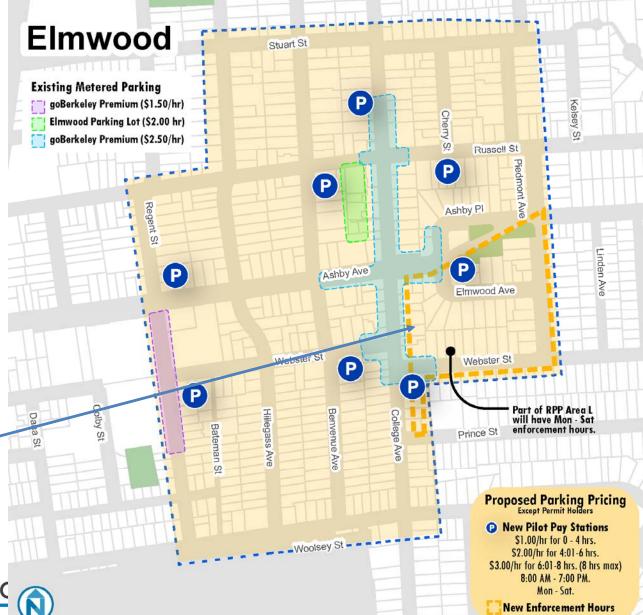
0-4th hrs: \$1.00/hr 4:01-6th hrs: \$2.00/hr

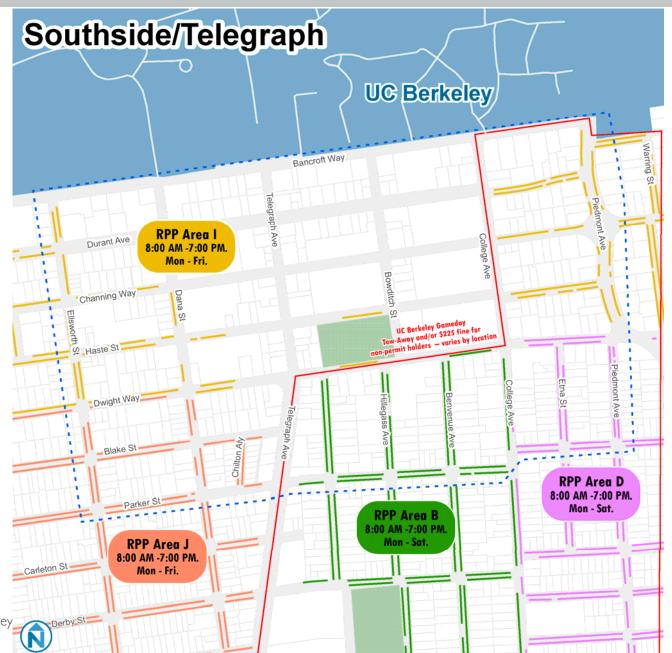

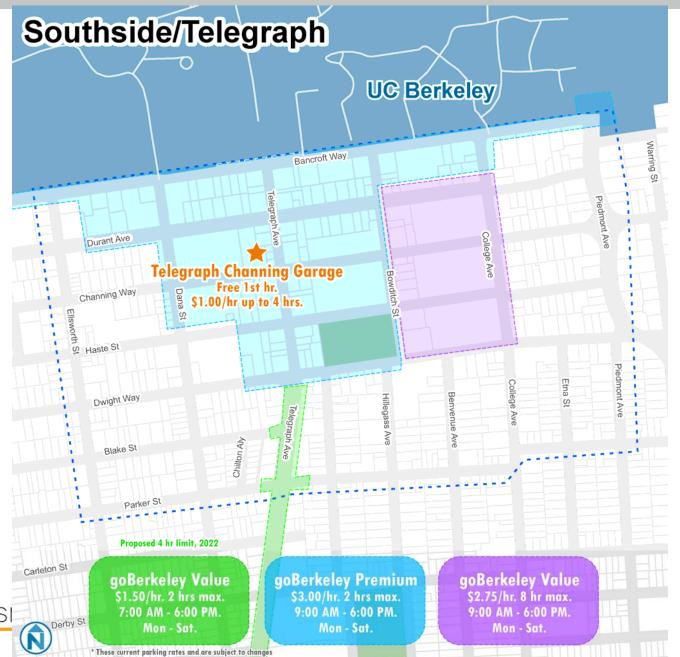

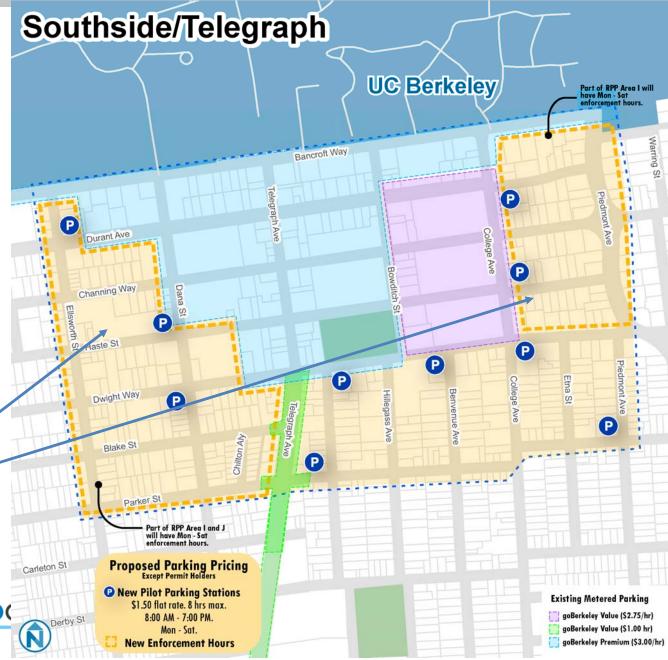

Concept Proposals - Residents











Unchanged

 RPP annual & visitor, In-Home Care, Disabled Person placards/plates still exempt from restrictions

Concept Proposal

- Parking managed for more open spaces when busy
- More flexibility for visitors, housekeepers, etc.
- Enforcement more effective
- New Saturday enforcement in part of RPP Area L
 (Elmwood) / RPP Areas I & J (Southside/Telegraph)
- New signage & pay stations at edge of pilot area





Concept Proposals – Employee/Visitor









Unchanged

Community Facility & Merchant Permits still exempt from visitor restrictions

Concept Proposal

- Park for up to 8 hours if paid
 - Elmwood: 4 hrs, \$4.00 / 6 hrs: \$8.00 / 8 hrs: \$14.00
 - Southside/Telegraph: \$12 total for 8 hours
- Pay by phone or via license plate entry meters
- More information about employee commute benefits/options







Concept Proposal – Community Feedback











- Two-hour shuffle not perceived to be a problem
- Alta Bates impact the concept proposal is too inexpensive and will invite medical employees to park in the neighborhood, negating benefits of RPP Program
- Concern about pricing for residents' visitors (family from out of town, short-term visits, etc.)
- Affordability for employees
- Location of license plate entry payment kiosks















- Shorter time limits (e.g., 4 hours)
- Don't use pricing
- Provide parking permits to employees
- Free transit passes for local employees
- Consider other sources of emissions like idling delivery vehicles
